To watch Amazon Prime on TV, you need a subscription (currently £7.99 a month or £79 a year) which also gives you access to film, music and free Amazon delivery) and a suitable streaming device (Amazon Fire stick or Roku are the main candidates, but not Chromecast; also the BT Youview+ TV service now has an app for Prime built-in). Amazon Prime states that it will offer on-demand replays and highlights of the ATP Tour, although there has been some dissatisfaction at the quality of service they provided earlier this year.

Amazon Prime is a streaming service, so can also be watched on computers, tablets and phones.

Other streaming services include:

- Tennis TV: streams the ATP Masters series (but not Grand slams) and costs around £89 a year; good streaming apps on mobile, tablet and computer (and TV via Chromecast), offers on-demand replays and videos of classic matches, and works around the world, but will now be more expensive than Amazon Prime
- WTA Live: costs around £8 a month or £59 a year
- Eurosport Player.

The streaming services have an advantage that they usually provide a choice of matches at any one time (as does the BBC coverage of Wimbledon with its red button service).
